





2016 ITG Award of Merit MICHAEL TUNNELL



Trumpeter and educator **MICHAEL TUNNELL** has been awarded the International Trumpet Guild's Award of Merit. This award is given to those individuals "who have made substantial contributions to the art of trumpet playing through performance, teaching, publishing, research, composition, and/or support of the goals of The International Trumpet Guild."

Michael Tunnell, highly gifted trumpeter, scored success in a variety of styles. He was Professor of Trumpet at the University of Louisville School of Music from 1988-2014, where he performed with the Louisville Brass and conducted the Trumpet Ensemble. He was awarded

the title of Distinguished Teaching Professor of Music and Scholar in 2003. Tunnell performed as Principal Trumpet with the Louisville Bach Society and as Auxiliary Trumpet with the Louisville Orchestra. A founding member of the brass quintet Sonus Brass, Tunnell toured the Far East and South America with this group. Tunnell was a former member of the music faculties of the University of Southern Mississippi, SUNY-Potsdam College, the University of Illinois, and the New England Music Camp.

Tunnell was a member of the International Trumpet Guild Board of Directors, and he served as a column editor for the ITG Journal from 1978-2000. He served on the Artist Faculty of the National Trumpet Competition and was an artist-clinician for Kanstul Trumpets. During his career, Tunnell recorded several albums, from contemporary music to Baroque works, performing on the modern trumpet, the corno d'caccia, and the Baroque trumpet.

Mike was born in Tucson, Arizona, and grew up in Powell, Tennessee, near Knoxville. He was a graduate of the University of Tennessee, where he majored in music/trumpet performance. He pursued graduate degrees at the University of Louisville (MM) and University of Southern Mississippi (DMA) and enjoyed a long career of performing and teaching at numerous colleges and universities. Teaching was a passion of his, and he cared deeply about his students' growth.

A quotation from his university web page sums up his love for teaching: "Part of the joy in teaching trumpet and music is that one can often see a transformation and development with students that perhaps do not exist in every discipline."

Michael passed away in December, 2014 after a long and courageous struggle with cancer. The ITG is proud to present this prestigious honor posthumously to Michael Tunnell.





RICHARD BIRKEMEIER, CHAIR of the

Conference Artist Committee, is Emeritus Professor of Music at the Bob Cole Conservatory at California State University, Long Beach. In his thirty-plus years at CSULB he has taught trumpet, brass ensembles, and music history with a specialization in the 19th century Wind Band. A graduate of the University of Wisconsin, Memphis State and Northwestern Universities, his teachers have included Donald Whitaker, Richard Steff and Vincent Cichowicz. Dr. Birkemeier has held faculty positions at Lakeland College, Northern Illinois University and Ohio Wesleyan University before coming to CSULB in 1985.

In addition to his teaching responsibilities, Dr. Birkemeier has served as Associate Dean of the College of the Arts, Vice-Chair

of the Music Department, and Director of the California Institute for the Preservation of Jazz. He is a professional trumpeter and conductor and has performed with among others: the Columbus Symphony, the Memphis Symphony, the Pacific Symphony, the Los Angeles Baroque Orchestra and the Golden State British Brass Band.

Since 1988, Dr. Birkemeier has been Musical Director of the Americus Brass Band, a Los Angeles-based professional brass ensemble that recreates 19th century American brass bands performing on original period instruments. He has led several national concert tours with the group, produced three critically acclaimed CDs, conducted the group at the Hollywood Bowl and made more than a dozen TV and movie appearances including Glory, Gettysburg, Geronimo: An American Legend, and Hidalgo.

Finally, he has written articles and served as an editor for the ITG Journal, directed the Festival of Trumpets concert at the London ITG conference in 1986 and co-hosted the 1996 Brassfest II with David Hickman here at CSULB.



TAMIR AKTA graduated from the Thelma Yellin School of the Arts, received the America-Israel Cultural Foundation Scholarship 1987-1995, and won the 1991 Interlaken Classics Competition. He was also principal trumpet with the Young Israel Philharmonic Orchestra.

Tamir completed his academic training at the Paris Conservatory, having studied with Guy Touvron. In Paris, he won competitions such as the Selmer Trumpet Competition. He participated in multiple chamber music festivals across Europe and gave official performances for the Israeli Embassy in Paris and Israeli consulates around Europe.

Since his return to Israel, he has performed extensively as a soloist, chamber musician, and orchestras. Music education is close to his heart and feels strongly about training the next generation of musicians. In addition to his performing schedule, Tamir teaches trumpet and supervises an elementary school music education project in Raanana. As a composer, Tamir has been writing for seven years and performs his own works in concert halls around Israel and Europe.





RALPH ALESSI was born in San Francisco, CA and is the son of classical trumpeter Joe Alessi and opera singer Maria Leone. After earning degrees in jazz trumpet and bass—he studied under the legendary Charlie Haden at CalArts—he lit out for New York, where he became a ubiquitous presence on the downtown scene. He has collaborated with such notable musicians as Steve Coleman, Jason Moran, Don Byron, Ravi Coltrane, Fred Hersch, Uri Caine and Dafnis Prieto. Alessi has recorded nine albums of original compositions, which encompass everything from post-bop to neo classical music.

As an educator, Alessi has been a member of the faculty of the Eastman School of Music and is currently the founder and director of the School for Improvisational Music (www.schoolforimprov.org), a non-profit entity currently holding improvisational music workshops in New York City and abroad. Currently, he is on the jazz faculty at New York University and New England Conservatory.



THE AMERICUS BRASS BAND is one

of America's best known professional brass ensembles. Founded 40 years ago, this Southern California Civil War replica band is nationally recognized for its authentic performance of 19th century brass music on authentic period instruments.

The Americus Brass Band has toured nationally for over 25 years and has recorded three critically acclaimed CDs, and

their music has been included on two additional movie soundtrack albums and two civil war CDs. The *Buffalo Bill Wild West Show Cowboy* Band CD was named a "Best of the Year" and "a must buy" by Randy Salas in *Fanfare Magazine*.

The Americus Brass Band is probably best known for its work in Hollywood where it has recorded sound-track music for and/or appeared on-screen in well over a dozen major motion pictures and television shows including *Glory, Gettysburg, Geronimo: An American Legend,* and *Hidalgo*.

Today, the ABB specializes in educational programs about the Civil War and is developing a new touring show that expands its repertoire to include historical reenactments of two additional 20th Century military bands.



JUSTIN BARTELS is the Principal Trumpet with the Colorado Symphony. In addition, he serves on faculty at the University of Colorado and is a Visiting Guest Artist in Orchestral Studies at the University of Denver. Justin has previously served on faculty at Regis University.

He has held principal trumpet positions with The Columbus Symphony, Central City Opera, Augusta Symphony, South Carolina Philharmonic and The Columbus Indiana Philharmonic. He has played Guest Principal Trumpet with the San Francisco Symphony, St. Louis Symphony and as

an extra with The New York Philharmonic, Alabama Symphony, Milwaukee Symphony, Los Angeles Philharmonic, Virginia Symphony and Houston Symphony.

Justin is a 2003 graduate of Indiana University. He also attended the University of Alabama and the University of Cincinnati. Justin was a member of the New World Symphony in Miami, Florida. Justin's teachers include: Marie Speziale, John Rommel, Ed Cord, Alan Siebert, Michael Johnson and Joe Ardovino.



BENJAMIN BERGHORN currently serves as an Adjunct instructor at Lansing Community College. He teaches privately in the Lansing (Michigan) area and has instructed in the Grand Ledge, Leslie and Grand Haven High School Districts and the Jackson Youth Symphony. He performs with the Jackson and Lansing Symphony Orchestras and is active as a guest artist and trumpet clinician.

In Fall 2011, he was named Guest Principal trumpet of the Beijing Symphony Orchestra, where he performed on Western and traditional music programs in Beijing's finest concert halls. Televised performances and a LIVE 'Placido Domingo and Friends' concert were highlights.

JASON BERGMAN is Assistant Professor of Trumpet at the University of North Texas. Previously, he was the Nina Bell Suggs Endowed Professor of Trumpet at The University of Southern Mississippi. He is also Principal Trumpet of the Mobile Symphony and Mobile Opera. His debut solo recording, On The Horizon, is available on the MSR label.

RAYMOND DAVID BURKHART was born in

1961 near Cleveland OH. His family then moved to Pittsburgh PA and to Red Bluff CA. He moved to Los Angeles for college, earning his BA with Honors in Music from Occidental College in 1983, his MM in Trumpet Performance from the University of Southern California in 1985, and beginning his multipronged career as a trumpeter, composer, conductor, educator, and music publisher. His teachers include William Bing, Rob Roy McGregor, Ed Tarr, Malcolm McNab, and Uan Rasey. He has fulfilled commissions for orchestra, band, brass band, choir, and

chamber ensembles. His brass catalog is extensive, including original 20 works for brass quintet, many of which were recorded by the Premiere Brass Quintet on their CD, "Watercolor Menagerie." In 2010 he earned a PhD in Musicology from Claremont Graduate University, and he has spoken on brass topics at conferences in New York, Paris, Edinburgh, and Glasgow.

CHARLES CALLOWAY is pursuing a DMA in Trumpet Performance at UMKC and is under the tutelage of Dr. Keith Benjamin. Prior to attending UMKC, Charles received his Bachelors from the University of Louisville and his Masters in Music from Southern Methodist University. As a former soloist of the Orchestre National de Lyon, he shares his gifts with many ensembles. For example, the Hexagone Brass Ensemble's talent, passion and originality are acknowledged internationally. They boast a reputation for teaching experience and perform both original and renewed repertoire. This unique ensemble regularly represents the French Brass School all over the world.

Dutot spent 22 years teaching at the Lyon Conservatoire National Supérieur de Musique, and is one of the most sought after teachers of the French tradition. Maurice André and Roger Delmotte sent young talents to finish lessons in his class and his master classes consistently leave indelible impressions throughout the world.



The ENSAMBLE NACIONAL DE TROMPETAS DE MÉXICO emerged in

2013 from the idea of promoting performance, experiences, ideas, and commitment to music. Each member has come from prestigious music institutions in the country such as Conservatorio Nacional de Música, Escuela Nacional de Musica, Escuela Superior de Música. Rehearsals include heavy focus on detail to help become a "group class" of trumpet players.

The group's repertoire consists mostly of original twentieth century music. This allows composers, some being trumpeters, to express all features of the instrument through contemporary styles. Other repertoire includes baroque transcriptions, classical arrangements, and Mexican music, which ensure the audience experience is well rounded. The group has appeared in concert halls, theaters, and other venues such as churches, subway stations, outdoors, and others with great audience appreciation. In January of both 2014 and 2016, the group organized a master class with renowned French trumpeter Pierre Dutot with over 100 participants.



BRIAN EVANS is Principal 3rd trumpet/cornet of the Australian Opera and Ballet Orchestra, at the Sydney Opera house. Since joining in 1975, he has played every chair in the section. He maintains a large studio of private students, from beginner to tertiary levels. He is a member of Opera Australia Brass, Trio Australis and has appeared as soloist in concerts and recitals as well as in lectures and master classes on three continents. Brian is founding President of the Australian Trumpet Guild and is very active in the International Trumpet Guild, being a director since 2001 and the current President. He hosted ITG's 2010 Annual Conference, in Sydney.



CHARLES B. "CHUCK" FINDLEY is an American session musician. Most widely known as a trumpet player, he also plays brass instruments such as flugelhorn and trombone. A graduate of the Cleveland Institute of Music, Findley's first professional work was with the Jimmy Dorsey Big Band before joining the Buddy Rich Band on a world tour. CSULB Director of Brass Studies **ROBERT FREAR** is in demand throughout the country as a trumpet performer and teacher. His solo CD "In the Big City" received excellent reviews in the U.S. and abroad. Under Dr. Gardner's direction, OSU's trumpet program has achieved distinguished success at the regional, national, and international levels.

Extracurricularly, Dr. Gardner is the Artist Coordinator for Music for Autism.

Dr. Gardner is a Bach Performing Artist and Clinician. He has recorded with Naxos, Mark Records, and BX Entertainment. He is indebted to all of his main trumpet teachers: Vincent Penzarella, Mark Gould. Marie Speziale, James Thompson, Boyde Hood, and Paul Salvo.



For over 20 years, ANDREA GIUFFREDI served as principal trumpet with the most important Italian symphony orchestras. In particular, he worked on a regular basis for the RAI (Italian National Television) Symphony Orchestra in Milan and Turin, the "Arturo Toscanini" Symphony Orchestra in Parma, and occasionally the "Teatro Comunale" in Florence and "Teatro alla Scala" in Milan. He has played under renowned conductors such as Riccardo Muti, George Prêtre, and Zubin Mehta. He frequently performs on commercial TV shows, with pop singers and has

played with artists such as Luciano Pavarotti, Ennio Morricone, and Liza Minnelli. He has published three CDs with Summit Records and has been invited four times to the renowned International Trumpet Guild conference. He also often travels to Asia for solo performances. Since 1993, he has been Professor of Trumpet at the Civica Scuola di Musica in Milan.



GORDON GOODWIN'S BIG PHAT BAND Gordon Goodwin aspired

to lead a big band from a time before he can even remember. His position as leader of the 18-piece Big Phat Band speaks reams about his seemingly limitless talents as an instrumentalist, composer, arranger. conductor and bandleader.

Swingin' for the Fences, the band's debut recording released in 2000, featured guest artists Arturo Sandoval and Eddie Daniels. It made history as the first commercially available DVD-Audio title ever released and the first DVD-Audio title to receive two Grammy nominations.

XXL, the Big Phat Band's followup recording in 2003, garnered three Grammy nominations and won the Surround Sound Award for Best Made Surround Sound Title.

The 2008 release of The Phat Pack marked the band's move to Immergent Records, also receiving a Grammy nomination. Since then, the band has released three more albums; Act Your Age, That's How We Roll, and Life in the Bubble.

"The musical philosophy of the Big Phat Band has, from the beginning, pushed back at these kinds of limits," says Goodwin. "This is a band made up of a group of musicians with diverse interests, and wide skill sets, and we have always strove to break down barriers between musical styles."



Born in Taipei, educated in Paris, **CHUNG-MOM HO** Ho is the founder and music director of MOMO Trumpet Ensemble and MOMO Brass Ensemble. He also works as lecturer at National Taiwan University of Arts and as trumpet section member in Evergreen Symphony Orchestra.

As a trumpet soloist, Ho has performed concertos internationally in Europe, Asia and South Africa and has won several prizes, including first prizes in the International Competition of UFAM (France) and Asia Pacific International Trumpet Competition (China), and third prizes in Jeju International Brass Competition (South Korea) and Bucharest International Trumpet Competition (Romania), etc. His first contemporary music album was released in 2005.

Chung-Mom Ho graduated with First Prize and passed unanimously by referees from CRR de Paris where he studied with Guy Touvron in 2003. With Excellent Prize, he passed unanimously by referees from CRR de Rueil-Malmaison where he studied with Eric Aubier in 2007.



THOMAS HOOTEN is Principal Trumpet of the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra. Prior to joining the Los Angeles Philharmonic. Hooten served as Principal Trumpet in the Atlanta Symphony from 2006-2012, where he was awarded the first ever Mabel Dorn Reeder Honorary Chair, a \$10,000 merit-based award for "excellence in musical artistry, leadership, collegiality and community engagement," He released Trumpet Call, his first solo album, in 2011.

Hooten has appeared as a soloist with the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra. the Saint Paul Chamber Orchestra, the United States Air Force Band, Keystone Winds, and the Richmond Symphony Orchestra. As an orchestral and chamber musician, he has performed with such ensembles as the National Symphony Orchestra, Harrisburg Symphony, Washington Symphonic Brass. Arlington Symphony, and the Baltimore Symphony. He has given master classes and recitals at Juilliard, Northwestern University, Indiana University, Mannes School of Music, San Francisco Conservatory, and many other locations throughout the United States. Hooten has appeared as a guest principal with the Saint Louis Symphony, at the Grand Teton Music Festival, and with the Los Angeles Philharmonic.

Hooten began his career in 2000 with a trumpet/cornet position in "The President's Own" United States Marine Band in Washington, D.C., where he was often a featured soloist. While with the Marine Band, Hooten won the 2nd trumpet audition with the Richmond (VA) Symphony, where he continued to perform through 2004. BOYDE W. HOOD is a legend in the trumpet world, particularly in Los Angeles. He played with the Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestra for close to 30 years and also served as principal trumpet with the Los Angeles Chamber Orchestra, the Royal Ballet, and American Ballet Theater, and has recorded extensively for major motion picture and television studios. But he is best known as one of the most sought-after trumpet pedagogues in the country. He continues to serve as trumpet professor at USC's Thornton School of Music. Boyde earned his BM in trumpet performance from the Eastman School of Music and MM in theory

and composition from Ball State University. He is a former member of the Dallas Symphony, Rochester Philharmonic, Milwaukee Symphony, Marlboro Festival, and the Victoria (BC) Symphony. Boyde recalls that a terrible fire in the fourth grade was responsible for his playing the trumpet. The fire burned sixty percent of his body and caused his right fingers to be amputated at the first joint above the knuckles, but then he says, "it turned out that my fingers just fit the trumpet," and the rest is history!



DAVID HUNSICKER is currently the trumpet professor at Wichita State University, and principal trumpet of the Wichita Symphony and the Lancaster Festival Orchestra.

He served as associate principal trumpet of the New Mexico Symphony Orchestra and principal trumpet of the Des Moines Metro Opera, and has performed extensively with orchestras such as the Phoenix Symphony, Detroit Symphony, Omaha Symphony, Florida Orchestra, and the Sarasota Opera.

Recent solo performances include Shostakovich's Concerto for Piano, Trumpet and Strings with the Wichita Symphony Orchestra and Eric Ewazen's Shadowcatcher with the Lancaster Festival Orchestra.

His career has ranged from appearing internationally as an orchestral soloist, being featured at the 2010 Vancouver Olympics, playing with the renowned Canadian Brass and a solo Command Performance for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. DR. MAICO LOPES is the Professor of Trumpet at the University of Brasilia (UnB). He specializes in chamber music for brass, research Brazilian music for unaccompanied trumpet and trumpet ensemble, and performing premiers of more than 20 pieces for these chamber groups over the last few years. Lopes earned his Doctor of Music from Federal University of the State of Rio de Janeiro (UNIRIO) with a major in Performance/Interpretive Practices. Working mainly in the area of Brazilian music and chamber music, he participated in the creation of the Laboratório de Pesquisa LIC-M1, a research laboratory focused on Brazilian music, specifically solo music, chamber music, and orchestral excerpts. Dr. Lopes is a founding member of the Brazilian Trumpet Association (ABT), and ITG affiliated Chapter, and a member of the International Trumpet Guild. Currently, he is a member of the editorial board of Trompete, a magazine from ABT, and has recorded his first solo album of unpublished Brazilian music for unaccompanied trumpet.



BOB MALONE, Yamaha's Director of Ateliers/R&D since 2001, has been an innovator in trumpet design since opening his business, *Bob Malone's Brass Technology* in Los Angeles in 1983. Accomplishments include the creation of unique leadpipe designs for C and Eb trumpets, the unique M1/M2 leadpipe tapers and custom trumpet conversions, all receiving critical acclaim from players the world over. In addition, the *MalonePipe* has been incorporated into the design of several of Yamaha's current trumpets. To date, Bob has played a leading role in the design of over 18 Yamaha trumpets and flugelhorns, including the recent 2nd generation Artist Model trumpets – the Chicago and New York series. Critical artist collaborations include fundamental design work

with Bobby Shew, Thomas Stevens, Håkan Hardenberger, John Hagstrom, Robert Sullivan, Wayne Bergeron, Thomas Hooten, Christopher Martin, Mark Inoyue, James Thompson as well as other top players -- most recently with David Bilger and Thomas Rolfs.



GIANNI MARINUCCI studied in the USA with Warren Vache, Laurie Frink and Bobby Shew. He has toured internationally and has played with many Australian jazz figures such as Don Burrows and James Morrison. He is a highly sought after jazz musician who collaborates in many ensembles around Australia. He also heads his own trio, quartet and nonet and is a regular performer in Melbourne jazz clubs. Gianni has released four recordings under his own name and has been featured on

many radio broadcasts on Australia's national broadcaster, the ABC. In 2009, he opened the Melbourne Italian Festival with a concert of the music of Ennio Morricone. In 2014, Gianni was featured at The Melbourne Recital Centre, soloing with the New Palm Court Orchestra and chosen as the first international act at the La Groove Jazz Club in New Caledonia. Gianni has traveled extensively around Australia conducting master classes and clinics at universities.



MALCOLM BOYD MCNAB began studying the trumpet at the age of nine, with his father Boyd McNab as his first teacher. Later, he studied with Pasadena trumpet teacher Walter Laursen, and performed with the Pasadena Symphony at the age of fourteen while still a student at Mark Keppel High School in Alhambra. At the age of 15, Malcolm began playing with the Young Musicians Foundation Debut Orchestra under conductors Dr. Miklos Rosza, Lawrence Foster, Gerhard Samuel and Henry Lewis. He also became the Principal Trumpet and librarian for the Pasadena Symphony under Dr. Richard Lert. It was at that time that

Malcolm began his studies with James Stamp, leading him to a most valuable path which he has followed for the past 54 years.

After touring with the San Francisco Ballet and service in the U.S. Army, playing with the West Point Band, he studied privately in New York City with John Ware and William Vacchiano of the New York Philharmonic. On returning to Southern California, McNab began working as a session musician as well as playing live solo performances with various regional orchestras. His recording credits in popular music include albums with Dionne Warwick, Peggy Lee, Chicago, and the Carpenters. McNab has performed on the soundtracks of over 2,000 films. In addition to movie and TV soundtracks.

Malcolm is presently Artist in Residence at Azusa-Pacific University. He has also found time to teach trumpet at UCLA, Pomona College, Claremont College and branches of the California State University. Malcolm is a B&S Artist and plays on his own line of instruments, the Exquisite Series, exclusively.



BERNARDO MEDEL is acting principal trumpet in the Xalapa Symphony Orchestra. As a soloist, he won national prizes for his interpretations of the Mexican band repertoire, introduced to him by his father and first teacher, Apolinar Medel, in San Felipe Otaltepec, Puebla. His teachers included Francisco Lopez and Abraham Vidal at the National Conservatory in Mexico City. He participated in outstanding ensembles, one being under Enrique Crespo (German Brass). He was principal trumpet of the Acapulco Philharmonic and the Puebla Symphonic Orchestra. He then joined Mexico's National Symphony Orchestra on their European tour,

and played at the Cervantes Festival with Bellas Artes. Medel currently teaches at Universidad Veracruzana and performs in the Esperanza Azteca Orchestra. He is a soloist in the classical bands of the tri-state region and conducts the Juquila Symphony Band. He was featured in a recording of the bullfight "pasos dobles" with the Plaza Mexico Band. Bernardo is a Schagerl artist.



HERMON MEHARI was the recent winner of the 2015 Carmine Caruso International Trumpet Competition and a semifinalist in the 2014 Thelonious Monk Jazz Competition. In 2014, he released the CD "Our Journey" with Diverse featuring Logan Richardson. He headlined the 2014 Jazz en Tête Festival in Clermont-Ferrand, France and was featured on Bobby Watson's 2013 release, "Check Cashing Day".

Hermon was also the winner of the 2008 National Trumpet Competiton and placed 2nd in the 2010 ITG competition. As a founding member of Diverse, whose debut album on Origin Records reached the Top 40 on the Jazzweek Charts. Hermon has performed with saxophonists Jaleel Shaw and Ben Van Gelder. He has also performed with Hubert Laws, Randy Brecker, Paul Mckee, Clay Jenkins and others. Hermon received his BM in Jazz Performance from the University of Missouri - Kansas City Conservatory of Music and participates in clinics and panels around the world.



MANU MELLAERTS studied trumpet, chamber music and pedagogy at the Lemmens-Institute in Leuven and at the Brussels Conservatory. After studying with Pierre Thibaud, Roger Delmotte, and Edward Tarr, he won the Belgian "Tenuto" contest in 1985 and was among the laureats of the international Trumpet Competition in Toulon (Fr.) in 1987. From 1984 to 1986, he was solo trumpet at the Flamish Radio Orchestra. In 1987 he became 1st solo-trumpet at the National Opera House "La Monnaie" (Brussels) and professor at the Royal Brussels Conservatory.

He regularly performs chamber music, works as a guest-conductor, and performs as a soloist in many European countries, focusing on baroque and

classical repertoire. He is regularly invited as a teacher and performer internationally. He is the founder and artistic director of the BELGIAN BRASS and part of the Trumpet-Trio "G-Brass", together with Slawomir Cichor (Poland) and Jose Chafer (Spain), accompained by Luc Ponet (organ).



ERIC MIYASHIRO was born to American father and Japanese mother in Honolulu, Hawaii. His father was a professional trumpet player with the world-famous Royal Hawaiian Band; his mother, a professional dancer/actress from Tokyo Japan. Eric was highly influenced by his father, and from early childhood took interest in playing all styles of music.

Eric began to study music in early grade school and achieved a level of mastery by 8th grade sufficient for his father to give him a set of trumpets (Eb, D, and a Bb Piccolo trumpet). It gave him an early start with baroque-type high register

classical trumpet parts. After attending Berklee College of Music, he traveled around the world as the lead trumpeter for Buddy Rich, Woody Herman, Stevie Wonder, Tower of Power and played with many jazz, pops, and classical artists.

Today Eric Miyashiro is an Internationally acclaimed first call trumpet player living in Tokyo. Eric is well known as a powerhouse lead player but he is also a first call classical symphonic musician. He leads his own big bands, EM band and the Blue Note Tokyo All Star Jazz Orchestra. Eric is also teaches at 4 music conservatories, and is in high demand as a composer/arranger. He is a Yamaha Performing Artist, clinician and he helped design the Yamaha YTR-8340EM Miyashiro model trumpet. Eric continues to travel extensively around the world as soloist/clinician.



International performer **DR. TORU "TIGER" OKOSHI was born in Ashiya City, Japan. At age 13, he saw Louis Armstrong perform live in Osaka six months after he began playing the trumpet. In 1972, after graduating from Kwansei Gakuin University with bachelor of commerce, he flew to the U.S. He graduated summa cum laude from Berklee College of Music, and as word of his abilities spread and he assembling a lengthy performance resume with musicians such as Buddy Rich and Gary Burton. Tiger has received several awards in Boston alone as well as a Teaching Excellence award and Distinguished Alumni Award from Berklee.

The Japanese government recognized Tiger's contributions to the better relationship between U.S. and Japan and awarded him the Ministry of Foreign Commendation award in 2014. He has performed additionally with Tony Bennett, Pat Metheny, Bela Fleck, Branford Marsalis, and many others. Tiger is currently a professor at Berklee College of Music and Yamaha artist.



Originally from Texas, **R. DALE OLSON** holds a Masters Degrees in Trumpet Performance from the University of North Texas, and in Experimental Psychology from California State University, Fullerton. In 2007, he was named Distinguished Alumnus of the University of North Texas.

Extensive research over sixty years has resulted in completion of approximately twenty book length works on trumpet performance, design, and testing. Olson has chosen only one, "Sensory Evaluation of Brass Musical Instruments", for publication. He is currently involved in a monumental work of analyzing every United States patent related to trumpet ever granted.

Olson has lectured at numerous Conferences of the International Trumpet Guild, University of Edinburgh, Scottish International Trumpet Festival, Rice University, and many colleges and universities.



GRANT S. PETERS is Professor of Music at Missouri State University where he teaches applied studio trumpet. He serves on the Board of Directors of the International Trumpet Guild. Prior to his appointment at Missouri State, he served as co-principal trumpet of the Orquesta del Principado de Asturias in northern Spain (1992). During the 1989 season, while a member of the Columbia Artists Management ensemble Dallas Brass, he recorded the album *A Merry Christmas with Brass* for the Word Label. His primary research focus is new works for the trumpet by American composers, and has numerous premiere performances at ITG conferences. He has recorded three solo CDs of new works for trumpet with piano, organ and wind ensemble. Peters holds the

Mr. Romm attended The Juilliard School where he earned Bachelor and Masters Degrees, and studied with William Vacchiano. In New York City, Mr. Romm performed with the New York Brass Society, the New York Philharmonic, the Radio City Music Hall Symphony Orchestra, and on Broadway.

In 1971, Romm joined the newly formed Canadian Brass and has performed with major orchestras and with the greatest living conductors in the world. Ron has both performed and recorded with leading artists including Wynton Marsalis, Arturo Sandoval, Jon Faddis, Doc Severinsen, and brass performers from the world's top orchestras.

In 2002, Mr. Romm accepted the distinguished position of Professor of Trumpet at The University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign.



MICHAEL SACHS joined The Cleveland Orchestra as Principal Trumpet in 1988. Originally from Los Angeles, Sachs attended UCLA receiving a B.A. in History before attending The Juilliard School. Former teachers include Mark Gould, Anthony Plog, and James Stamp.



ARTURO SANDOVAL A protégé of the legendary jazz master Dizzy Gillespie, Sandoval was born in Artemisa, a small town outside Havana, on November 6, 1949. Sandoval began studying classical trumpet at twelve years old, but it didn't take him long to catch the excitement of the jazz world. He has since evolved into one of the world's most dynamic and acknowledged guardians of jazz trumpet and flugelhorn, a renowned classical artist, pianist and composer. Sandoval has been awarded 10 Grammy's, 6 Billboard Awards and an Emmy Award. In 2013, Arturo received the Presidential Medal of Freedom. One frequently speaks of Arturo

Sandoval's virtuoso technical ability or his specialty in high notes, but he who has seen him on the piano, improvising on a ballad, or enjoyed his compositions from straight ahead jazz, Latin jazz or classical, recognizes that Arturo is one of the most brilliant, multifaceted and renowned musicians of our time.



JOHN SCHLABACH is Professor of Trumpet at Ohio University, Athens where has won the School of Music "Distinguished Teaching Award." He is an active solo, orchestral, and chamber musician. He has presented recitals and master classes at universities throughout the country, is principal trumpet in the Ohio Valley Symphony, and performs frequently with the West Virginia and Columbus (OH) Symphony Orchestras.

Schlabach has written a number of educational articles that have appeared in publications such as The International Trumpet Guild (ITG) Journal and The Instrumentalist. His article "On Connecting the Ear and Brass Performance"

Directed and founded in 1999 by trumpet player Cindy Shea, the Mariachi Divas continue to lead the way in the mariachi genre. A two-time GRAMMY Award winner, with a total of six GRAMMY nominations and two Latin GRAMMY nominations, the Mariachi Divas are a multicultural, all-female ensemble imbued with the unique musical flavor of Los Angeles. The Divas discography includes 10 albums released through Shea Records and East Side Records.

In addition, the Divas have appeared in independent films including Dead Man's Show, Ren and Ia Dentista, in which their music is featured in the movie's soundtrack. The Diva's rendition of the Ricky Martin hit, "La Bomba" was used in the 2008 film, Julia. Their music is also included in the movie, Mariachi Gringo, and two of their Christmas songs are featured on Hallmark cards.

Jason has toured with a diverse lineup of artists since 1989 including Ray Charles, Arturo Sandoval, the Jaco Pastorius (Word of Mouth) Big Band, Woody Herman Orchestra, Maynard Ferguson, Paul Anka, Frank Sinatra Jr., K.C. and the Sunshine Band, Dr John, the Original Wildcat Jass Band and the Denver based H2 Big band.

McCabe began her musical instruction on piano at age 6 and trumpet at age 10. She earned her bachelor's degree in music and elementary education from Illinois Wesleyan University in Bloomington in 2001. After studying and performing in Russia, Germany and Holland, Uri earned his PhD in composition from the University of Bar-llan (Israel). MATTHEW BURTNER is an Alaskan-born composer and sound artist. An international award-winning composer, his experience growing up in Alaska shaped his approach to music. Burtner is Professor of Composition and Computer Technologies (CCT) in the Department of Music at the University of Virginia. He is also Founder of the environmental arts non-profit organization, EcoSono (http://www.ecosono.org).

Burtner works closely with politicians, scientists and musicians, creating music in support of sustainability. In 2014 he was invited to Brazil to work with former Vice President, Al Gore on Climate Reality, and in 2015 he was invited by the US State

Department to create the soundtrack for President Barrack Obama's visit to Alaska. In 2015 he was also a featured presenter on the Smithsonian Magazine's *Future is Here* Festival and the Smithsonian Natural History Museum's Arctic Spring Festival. His chamber music is played widely in festivals and concerts around the world.



RUDOLF HAKEN is a composer and violist internationally renowned for his creative melding of disparate musical styles and genres. Haken's compositions have met with great success internationally in performances by artists such as violinist Rachel Barton Pine, violinist Stefan Milenkovich, flutist Jean Ferrandis, oboist Nancy Ambrose King, and Paul Merkelo (Principal Trumpet of the Montreal Symphony). A CD of concertos composed by Rudolf Haken was chosen as a 2007 "Critics' Choice" by American Record Guide. His works have been performed at several viola congresses as well as conventions of the North American Saxophone Alliance and the International

Double Reed Society. As an advocate of the five-string viola Haken has been featured in the Journal of the *American Viola Society* as well as *The Strad*. He is currently a viola professor at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, having previously has served on the faculty of West Virginia University.



MICHAEL MIKULKA completed his DMA in Composition at the University of Texas, where he studied with Donald Grantham, Russell Pinkston, Yevgeniy Sharlat, and Dan Welcher. He completed his MM in Composition at Central Michigan University (studying with David Gillingham), and received his undergraduate degree in Music Education from Rutgers University, where he co-founded the Rutgers Undergraduate Composers Recital.

Over 25 of Michael's compositions have been honored as winners or finalists in competitions or calls for scores. His pieces have been premiered by performers such as Robert Dick, and by members of the Dallas Symphony Orchestra, Seattle Symphony, and New Jersey Symphony Orchestra.

Michael is the founder of newbandmusic.com and newchambermusic.org, free services which promote self-published music. He was also founder and conductor of the Vine Orchestra, which premiered over 50 short compositions. Michael is a horn player, and has recently performed with the top UT ensembles, and has premiered several solo and chamber pieces.



ERIC NATHAN a 2013 Rome Prize Fellow and 2014 Guggenheim Fellow, has garnered acclaim internationally through performances at the New York Philharmonic's 2014 Biennial, Aldeburgh Music Festival, Tanglewood Festival of Contemporary Music, Aspen Music Festival, MATA Festival, Cabrillo Festival of Contemporary Music, Ravinia Festival Steans Institute, Yellow Barn, 2012 and 2013 World Music Days, and Louvre Museum. and violinist Jennifer Koh for a new solo work to premiere at the New York Philharmonic's 2016 Biennial. Nathan currently serves as Assistant Professor of Music in Composition-Theory at the Brown University Department of Music.



The music of **ANTHONY PLOG** has been performed in over 30 countries and he has been the recipient of numerous commissions by major orchestras and brass quintets. Mr. Plog now writes in many different mediums, including three children's operas, a major tragic opera (SPIRITS), and his latest opera entitled THE SACRIFICE. Other new works include the Double Concerto and 2 Horn Concerti. His brass works have been required pieces for many international brass competitions.

By age 19, Anthony Plog was playing extra trumpet with the Los Angeles Philharmonic and his orchestral career included positions with orchestras in San

Antonio, Utah, Malmo (Sweden), and Basel (Switzerland). Plog has toured the world as a soloist and has made chamber music an important part of his musical life. He is a founding member of both the Fine Arts Brass Quintet and Summit Brass.

Anthony Plog currently holds a 60% position teaching at Norwegian Music Academy in Oslo, Norway.



JOHN PRESCOTT is a Professor of Music at Missouri State University where he teaches theory, composition, and world music. His compositions are published by Alfred Publications, Balquhidder Music, Cimarron Press, Dorn Publications, Eighth-Note Press, the International Trombone Association Press, JPM Publications, Tezak Publications, TRN Publications, Warner Brothers, and Wingert-Jones Publications (J.W. Pepper). His compositions include works for band, orchestra, chorus, solo and chamber works, and multi-media pieces, and have been performed nationally and internationally.

Dr. Prescott holds degrees in music theory and composition from Florida State University and from the University of Kansas where he studied composition with John Pozdro and James Barnes. Dr. Prescott has been a member of the American Society of Composers, Authors, and Publishers (ASCAP) since 1988, and has been the recipient of an ASCAP Standard Award every year since 1989. He is also a member of the National Association for Music Education (NAfME).



CHARLES RESKIN was born in New York City and grew up in South Florida. He graduated from the Juilliard School in 1968, where he studied trumpet with William Vacchiano and composition with Hall Overton. Mr. Reskin has performed in virtually every type and genre of music, from symphony, ballet and opera to Broadway musicals and jazz bands. He has toured with the show Les Misèrables and with K.C. and the Sunshine Band. In 2007 the first of his popular trumpet etude/duet books, Trumpet Outings, was published by Editions BIM, a high-profile Swiss

publishing house specializing in music for brass. At this point Mr. Reskin now has ten works in their catalog, including his Sonata for Trumpet (and Flügelhorn) and Piano, which was performed on the 2013 ITG new Works Recital. He has just completed Passages, a larger work for solo trumpet, four horns, tympani and strings, which is also available from Editions BIM.



Born in São Paulo in 1979, **FELIPE SENNA** graduated in Composition and Conducting from the State University of Sao Paulo (Unesp-2002), receiving his Master of Arts in Music degree with distinction from the City University of London (2012), under The Newby Trust Scholarship. 1st Prize Winner of *Camargo Guarniere Composition Competition* and *Ritmo e Som Competition*, he received distinguished prizes in Brazil and abroad, being nominated for The Golden Eye 'Best International Film Music' (Zurich Film Festival-2013). Arranger and pianist alongside great personalities of Brazilian music — such as Grammy winner Airto Moreira and nominee Nailor Proveta — he became a prolific composer whose work extends from his roots in Brazilian music to chamber and

symphonic creations. Currently working in commissions from soloists and orchestras from Mexico, France, Spain, Germany and Brazil, Senna nurtures an increasing interest in works of collaboration among arts — a passion firstly developed as music director in Musical Theater, Opera and Theater productions.



JAMES STEPHENSON Leading ensembles and soloists around the world have performed the music of Chicagobased composer James M. Stephenson, both to critical acclaim and audience delight.

Most recently, Charles Vernon - Chicago Symphony bass trombonist - asked Stephenson to write a new concerto for premiere with Riccardo Muti. She has appeared as concerto soloist with the Philips Symphony Orchestra in Amsterdam, and with the Piracicaba Symphony Orchestra in Brazil. An avid collaborative pianist, Jasmin has served as Collaborative Pianist in Residence at the Banff Centre in Canada, and Accompanying Coordinator at Western Illinois University. Currently Jasmin is Assistant Professor of Piano at the University of South Alabama. Born in Japan, she is a graduate of Tokyo University of the Arts, and holds Doctor of Music and Master of Music degrees in Piano Performance from Indiana University Jacobs School of Music, where she studied with Emile Naoumoff, the last protégé of Nadia Boulanger.



BILL CUNLIFFE Jazz pianist, composer and Grammy Award-winning arranger, Bill Cunliffe grew up in Andover, Mass. He studied jazz at Duke University with pianist Mary Lou Williams and received his master's degree from the Eastman School of Music. He was the 1989 winner of the Thelonious Monk International Piano Competition.

Bill began his career as pianist and arranger with the Buddy Rich Big Band and worked with Frank Sinatra, Joe Henderson, Freddie Hubbard, Benny Golson and James Moody. He has since established himself as a solo artist, a bandleader with more than a dozen albums under his name, and a distinguished university professor.

Recent recordings include the Bill Cunliffe Trio album River Edge, New Jersey and his Overture, Waltz and Rondo for jazz piano, trumpet and orchestra (2012) for which he won his fifth Grammy nomination. In 2010, the Los Angeles Jazz Society honored Bill with its Composer/Arranger Award and he was named a "Distinguished Faculty Member" of the College of the Arts at California State University. 1. DR. JEREMY MCBAIN - THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS AT TYLER

The Role of the Cornet à Pistons in the Early Symphonic Works of Hector Berlioz

It is easy to assume that Berlioz was fond of the cornet, given how frequently and prominently he wrote for it, but it was actually quite the opposite. His first melodic soprano brass parts were in fact written for the trompette à pistons, an instrument which was initially rejected by the French players due to their infatuation with the purity of sound of the natural trumpet. Berlioz ended up rewriting the parts for the cornet à pistons and it subsequently took on a new role in the symphonic repertoire.

The Symphonie Fantastique manuscript dates from 1826 with revisions up until 1933, with the exception of the obbligato cornet solo from the 2nd movement, which was added at a later date. Berlioz scholars agree that this obbligato part was indeed written for a concert in May of 1844 at the Théâtre Italien in Paris featuring Jean Baptiste Arban. There are significant differences between the trompette à pistons and cornet à pistons parts in the original manuscript and his published score from 1845 as well as mention the similarity between the cornet à pistons and the horn parts.

The preeminent account of the arrival of valved brass in France is in the 1857 treatise of François George Auguste Dauverné, who was the first professor of trumpet at the Paris Conservatory from 1833 to 1869 as well as the principal trumpet of the Paris Opera from 1820 to 1851. While Dauverné speaks highly of the innovation of the valve and its application to the trumpet in his treatise, he also acknowledges the primitive form and inferior sound of the valved trumpet that was brought from Germany by the conductor Gaspare Spontini in 1826. He also notes successful improvements to the valved trumpet the following year and a number of works by Cheland, Rossini, and Meyerbeer in which he used the instrument in the Paris Opera.

Berlioz did not speak highly of the cornet à pistons in his Treatise or other writings. This was largely due to the music with which it was originally associated. The cornet became extremely popular in the nineteenth century in open-air concerts led by Phillipe Musard, Valentino, and Jullien. These three French conductors used the cornet as a solo instrument and recruited some of the best musicians in the country. The cornet à pistons was intrinsically tied to popular music and thus was frowned upon by the regular concertgoers of the Paris Opéra and Conservatoire. Yet Berlioz was able to use the cornet à pistons to great advantage in the orchestra.

The cornet à pistons consequently became a surrogate instrument, played by both horn players and trumpeters, allowing Berlioz to write melodically due to the instrument's ability to play chromatically throughout its two-octave usable range. In doing so, he created a new orchestral instrumentation of two natural trumpets and two valved cornets, a tradition that continued in France into the twentieth century.

Berlioz should be given credit in large part for trumpeters' acceptance of the valves in France. With the cornet à pistons being the first valved brass instrument that French musicians embraced,

Berlioz used it to write for brass in a melodic way giving it a definitive voice in the Romantic Period. His music elevated the stature of the cornet à pistons and the esteem in which it was held. We can see through Berlioz' music how the natural, valveless trumpet parts, while still effective, were limited due to their dependence on the notes from the open harmonic series. Berlioz's writing for the cornet à pistons is melodically rich, challenges technical virtuosity, and provides color and depth in the harmony due to its versatility as a chromatic instrument.

2. DR. AARON WITEK - UNIVERSITY OF LOUISIANA AT MONROE

Gordon Mathie, Master Teacher and Performer: A Reflection on his Career and Teaching Methodologies

One of the most powerful gifts one can give to the world is the ability to influence others and make a lasting impact within a community. Renowned trumpet performer and educator, Dr. Gordon William Mathie (b. 1924) has accomplished this. Mathie taught a majority of his career at the Crane School of Music (State University of New York at Potsdam) as Professor of Trumpet, Music Education and Chair of Performance, along with being Professor Emeritus.

Mathie's influence on the trumpet world is indeed prodigious. He has fostered the careers of many great performers and educators who are now continuing his legacy, such as David Bamonte (Oregon Symphony), Bill Bing (Los Angeles Opera "Orchestra and Los Angeles Opera Orchestra), Roger Blackburn (Philadelphia Orchestra), Phil Collins (Cincinnati Symphony and Professor at Cincinnati Conservatory), Mark Gould (Metropolitan Opera Orchestra, Professor at The Juilliard School and Manhattan School of Music), David Greenhoe (Quad City Symphony Orchestra, Cedar Rapids Opera Theatre, and Professor at the University of Iowa), Gerard Schwarz (international soloist, American Brass Quintet, American Symphony Orchestra, and conductor of the Seattle Symphony Orchestra), James Thompson (international soloist, Atlanta Symphony Orchestra, Montreal Symphony Orchestra, and Professor at the Eastman School of Music), James Underwood (Columbus Symphony Orchestra and "The President's Own" United States Marine Band), among countless others.

Throughout his career, Mathie has published a variety of works exploring topics such as teaching, instrumental studies, and ensemble works. In addition, he is not only a frequent contributor to the *International Trumpet Guild Journal*, but also one of the founding members of this organization. A vast majority of Mathie's career was spent as a chamber musician with the Potsdam Brass Quintet. He also made his mark as a professional orchestral musician performing with the Detroit and Vermont Symphony Orchestras. In addition, he performed as solo cornetist in the Leonard Smith Concert Band.

Mathie has been recognized for his exceptional contributions to the trumpet community as a performer and educator when he was bestowed the first International Trumpet Guild "Award of Merit." His love and passion for music, along with his success as a teacher and performer are notable and valuable, and deserve to be shared with the music community. The purpose is to share Mathie's successful career as a pedagogue and performer and to provide a synthesized depiction of Mathie's teaching methodologies. The primary sources were taken from articles in the *International Trumpet Guild Journal, The Instrumentalist*, as well as interviews with Mathie, his former students, and close colleagues, providing first hand account of Mathie's career as a pedagogue and performer.

Mathie's influence on the trumpet world is prodigious. He has impacted many great performers and educators who now are helping continue his legacy. His numerous musical arrangements, articles in The *International Trumpet Guild Journal*, along with his "Trumpet Teachers Guide" have been significant in the trumpet field.

3. RUSSELL ZIMMER - UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA, LINCOLN.

A New Look at the Playing Style of Theodore "Fats" Navarro and His Influence on Modern Jazz Trumpet

Although Theodore "Fats" Navarro's influence on modern jazz trumpet playing is widely accepted, little material exists that delves into his limited studio output. The majority of Navarro's studio recordings allowed for only one or two choruses of improvisation, often at the expense at true organic improvisation. Trying to execute similar lines on each take, newly released recordings illustrate Navarro's frustration throughout multiple takes of the same tune. Fortunately, there have been re-released live recordings that show Navarro's true abilities as an improviser and a clear shift to modern jazz trumpet playing. For this reason I have chosen to thoroughly study these live recordings in order to get a sense of the organic nature of Navarro's improvisational style. Too often are jazz solos analyzed in terms of "licks" or contrived patterns which can leave the student with material they can "insert" over harmony into an improvised solo, without understanding how the melodic material works or functions. This is not to say only creating clear cadential material, but being able to create endless melodic lines over static and changing harmony.

This presentation will be part of a doctoral document currently in progress that analyzes in depth two live recordings less than two years from Navarro's death at the peak of his development. These live recordings show how Navarro had combined and mastered the bebop language of Charlie Parker and Dizzy Gillespie into a more obtainable language that would quickly become the basis for modern jazz trumpet playing. Although Navarro had a strong high register, he gradually refrained from using it for mere audience enjoyment. He played with an even sound throughout the full range of the horn and quickly separated himself from the "hotter" swing styles of idols Roy Eldridge and Howard McGhee.

Concepts of Navarro's harmonic approach and use of melodic and rhythmic forward motion will be discussed based on the transcriptions from the two live performances mentioned above. This information will be reduced in such a way that can be used by classical, jazz, and commercial trumpet players in their daily routines to aid in their understanding of the bop language. Exercises will range from easy to hard beginning with a way to practice major scales using diatonic surround notes to creating eighth-note based lines that outline harmony with chromatic surround notes. In addition to melodic and conceptual material, special attention will be made throughout the presentation on how Navarro's development led to the modern sound and style of bop trumpet playing. The resurfacing of these recordings allows us to better connect the dots to Navarro's successor, Clifford Brown. The final research document will help bring back to the forefront the importance of Theodore "Fats" Navarro and his impact on the development of jazz trumpet.

4. MICHELLE GLASSCOCK - UNIVERSITY OF NORTH TEXAS

Increased Learning and Mastery through Focus of Attention, Internal vs. External, in Trumpet Performance & Pedagogy

Attentional focus has been studied for decades in sports psychology and continues to be developed and understood not only in sports psychology but also in the field of motor skill acquisition. However, in the field of music there has been one study conducted, researching focus of attention (FoA) in a group of piano players, and one article published coining the term Locus, referring to the location of focus in vocalists. In the area of brass pedagogy and performance, there has not been any research extending from the research in sports psychology or motor skill acquisition, about the benefits of an external FoA and how it can be used to further develop and enhance the teaching of trumpet.

In Sports Psychology, research examining internal vs. external FoA has been ongoing for over twenty years. The work done in this field provides evidence that strongly suggests that similar research would prove to also be highly beneficial in the field of music pedagogy. Learning an instrument is a form of motor skill acquisition, similar to that of learning a sport movement, and therefore the process of applying these concepts can be transferred and applied to music study and performance, especially wind playing. The research has determined that an external focus of attention increases the speed at which a motor skill is learned, the retention rate of the skill is heightened, and the level of errors in higher pressure situations are decreased.

For years there have been two schools of thought in brass pedagogy: 1) Playing by sound 2) Playing by feel. Vincent Cichowicz taught that a good sound indicated that the body had figured out and naturally corrected any physical deficiencies through the analysis of the product. Arnold Jacobs and William Adam, were also of the same pedagogical beliefs. On the other side, with a later pedagogical approach, James Stamp, favored the concept that if a player masters their physical approach and the trumpet, then a good sound would follow. These two mental approaches are examples of guiding a player's FoA. There are two ways FoA can be directed: Internal or External. For example, Cichowicz, believing that the body will figure out the most efficient means to producing the desired sound using an External FoA; however, Stamp conversely believing that the player should be acutely aware of the adjustments needed to achieve the desired sound production thereby asking the player to have an internal FoA. Sound production is the most tangible concept to understand and apply an external FoA; however, directing a player's FoA is applicable to many more areas including articulation, air movement, intonation, phrasing, style, blend and balance.

Initial research discusses how the literature defines attentional focus, alongside an overview of the literature review. I will review several studies focusing on external vs. internal focus of attention in sports, and I will review the two publications in music. In addition, I will also conduct an analysis of interview data from leading experts in the fields of sports psychology, music education and research, and brass pedagogy. From the experts interviewed, I provide expert opinions from the music researchers and brass teachers on the benefits of using an external FoA. Lastly, based on expert experience, and opinion, I will provide practical applications of how to apply an external FoA in trumpet pedagogy and performance.

5. EMILY J. MCGINNIS - UNIVERSITY OF MISSOURI-KANSAS CITY

Female Participation in Brass Bands: International Perspectives

This session presents a brief history on the development of the brass band, share experiences of women in brass bands throughout the world, explore implications for male and female performers and ensemble directors, and make connections to youth instrumental programs. A summary of the research culminating in this presentation is provided below.

Women have historically been underrepresented in a variety of instrumental ensembles, yet many female brass players have overcome instrument-gender stereotypes and audition discrimination to achieve positions in professional-level ensembles. Women in community instrumental ensembles, such as brass bands, have faced similar struggles. Top brass bands throughout the world now have female members—though not in equal numbers as males—but the inclusion of women in brass bands continues to be a sensitive subject in some countries.

This study explored the following questions: 1) What is the ratio of female to male participants in the top-ranked brass bands in the world? 2) How does this ratio vary by instrument type? 3) How does this ratio vary across countries? 4) How do women describe their experiences in brass bands?

A gender analysis was completed for 50 of the top-200 ranked brass bands in the world, representing thirteen countries. This analysis determined that females are still the minority, 22% overall, and three quarters of the bands have less than 30% female membership. Norwegian bands have the highest percentage of female membership (41% overall), with one band having more females (52%) than males. Women are most frequently found in the horn section, with flugelhorn having the highest percentage of females (48%).

At the time of submission, fourteen women from eight different countries had participated in an interview for this study. These women represented the following sections: cornet, flugelhorn, tenor horn, baritone, euphonium, trombone, and conductor. The interview included four demographic questions (age, race, country of origin, instrument played) and two open-ended questions, one regarding the history of the woman's participation in brass band, and the second asking her to describe her experiences in brass band.

Participants shared many positive stories about their experiences in brass band, including enjoyment of the camaraderie, intense rehearsals, and high level of musicianship. Participants also shared experiences of negative gender-based differences, including males expecting lower musical ability from females, discrimination following marriage and motherhood, sexist jokes, and unfair seat placements favoring men. Many women reported experiencing better acceptance from younger males in the ensemble, and noticed more equal gender representation in youth brass band programs in their country. This suggests that gender equality may be more expected among younger generations of brass band members. Because of this, many women were optimistic about continued improvement in representation and experiences for females in brass bands.

6. JESSE MCBEE -UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA, LINCOLN


A Structured Approach to Practice and Development as a Jazz Trumpet Player and Improvising Musician

Many trumpet players, particularly advanced students, have an interest and passion for jazz trumpet and improvisation, but find the development of these skills to be unattainable. There is an almost "mystical" block that exists, causing many students to abandon the pursuit altogether, instead choosing to be an observer rather than a participant in this language. The purpose of my research is to assess the importance of establishing effective daily habits that deal with the demands of improvisation. I frequently hear students say when it comes to improvising, "I don't know what to practice." It is my contention that proficiency can be developed in the same way one develops technical abilities, learns etudes or orchestral excerpts. Trumpet teachers throughout the world have codified approaches to these skills in their studios, and there is no reason that the same approach cannot be taken to teaching jazz improvisation.

My research first assesses several popular jazz education materials, and discusses advantages of such materials, and misconceptions and/or shortcomings of relying solely on these. Materials assessed in this paper include Flexus by John McNeil and Laurie Frink, Jamey Aebersold Play-A-Longs, *Patterns for Improvisation* by Oliver Nelson, among others. I also utilize interviews with several professional jazz musicians and college educators, considering how their approach to trumpet and jazz pedagogy is structured. This includes how their studios are structured, and how their students are coached in regards to developing a practice routine conducive to the improvising musician.

My research culminates with my suggestions as to a structured practice routine, as informed by traditional applied studio pedagogy (dealing predominately with Western art music), as well as the practice techniques of established jazz artists. My suggestion is that the student develops a daily jazz routine parallel to a technique routine. This includes playing long tones over the tonic





note of standard chord progressions (similar to long tones), playing idiomatic phrases (or "licks") through all twelve keys, practicing a variety of scales (to include "bebop" and "altered") with both traditional and "jazz" articulations, approaching practicing transcriptions as one would practice etudes, and developing a base of jazz repertoire through tune learning. In the same way that we deal daily with trumpet maintenance and building our technique, we can maintain and build our vocabulary and technique as an improvising musician.

7. GILMAR CAVALCANTE DA SILVA - VALDOSTA STATE UNIVERSITY

Estudos Bem Humorados Para Trompete by Fernando Morais: An Introduction

Fernando Morais (b. 1966) is a significant contemporary Brazilian composer of works for brass instruments. He plays horn in the Claudio Santoro National Theater Symphonic Orchestra and teaches at the Brasília School of Music. Several of his compositions have received international performances. Three of his best-known works for trumpet are *Peça Concertante* for trumpet and piano (2005), Concertino for Trumpet and String Orchestra (2013), and Elegy for Brass Quintet (2003).

The purpose of this presentation is to introduce his *Estudos Bem Humorados para Trompete Solo* (*Humorous Etudes for Solo Trumpet*) (2013), an unpublished collection of 12 short character pieces in native Brazilian styles. The history and current practices of Brazilian trumpet pedagogy will be discussed, and the *Estudos* will be placed within that context and within the broader context of international practices.

The Estudos Bem Humorados para Trompete Solo merit attention for three reasons. First, they are good music, worthy of study and performance. Second, they can act as a resource to preserve native Brazilian popular styles and to introduce those styles to non-Brazilians. Third, they are pedagogically useful as alternatives to other, better-known, etudes. To support these claims two of the etudes will be analyzed in some detail.
